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

Dear Parents / Caregivers,

Welcome to week 8 of the term. The students are working well and are busy completing assessments and projects as we head towards the end



Four of our year six students have been chosen to represent our school at The STEM Aboriginal Learner Congress in Adelaide in August. Beginning in 2017, the congress is a departmental initiative designed by Aboriginal students, elders and academics to engage and inspire the future STEM pathways for young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians. This year's Congress will be attended by 178 schools with a total of approximately 700 participants. We congratulate Chris, Elizabeth, Donn and Phoenix from The Sixers who have been chosen to attend this year. We look forward to hearing about your trip.

Tori and Courtney from Headspace visited our school last week to work with the Year 5/6 girls around the positive and negative uses of social media. They discussed the different forms of social media, such as gaming sites, YouTube and Pinterest, along with popular apps like Snapchat and Instagram. The girls did activities around the impact and consequences of inappropriate use and what to do if they are caught up in online bullying. We are following this up with a presentation from the South Australian Police around Cyber Related Laws.

In week 10 we celebrate NAIDOC week. NAIDOC Week honours the history, culture, contribution, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and is celebrated from the first Sunday to the second Sunday of July. We are currently working on the events and timetable for the week and more information will be sent home soon.

Our teachers have been busy writing student reports, which will be sent home at the end of the term. The staff at Hincks continue to provide supportive and encouraging classroom environments in which to stimulate a love of learning. We encourage you to take the time to read the feedback provided of your child's successes and future learning goals.

News from Music with Mr West

Lighthouse and Prickly Bunch

The Lighthouse and Prickly Bunch classes have been exploring music in many ways. They have been singing using solfege, a technique that uses hand signals to identify musical notes, making learning fun and interactive. Alongside, they have been playing with boom whackers, long, tuned tubes, to accompany music tracks and videos. These students have also been drawing pictures to interpret music, enhancing their creative skills. Dance and movement have been included to express how music makes them feel. Lastly, they have been playing glockenspiels, a percussion instrument, with piano accompaniment, fostering their musicality.





G.O.A.T.S and Mighty Lions

The G.O.A.T.S and Mighty Lions have been honing their vocal and instrumental skills. They have also been using solfege to improve their note recognition. To expand their musical abilities, these classes have been learning to play the recorder, a woodwind instrument. They have also started reading and interpreting rhythm notation, enabling them to play rhythm patterns on drums as a group.

The Sixers have been engaged in ensemble playing, an excellent team-building exercise that enhances musical synchronization. They have been learning to read music as a group, which involves understanding musical notations and symbols. In addition, they have been working on written exercises to recognize different musical notations and rhythms. Playing the ukulele has been an added musical adventure. Like the other classes, they have been participating in aural recognition activities, where they listen and identify different notes and rhythms.
